What's So Special About Easter?

The story is told about a Sunday School class of four year olds in Chattanooga, Tennessee. The teacher looked at her class and asked, "Does anyone know what today is?" A little girl raised her hand and said, "It's Palm Sunday!" The teacher said, "That's great! Does anybody know what next Sunday is?" The same little girl raised her hand again and said, "Next Sunday is Easter!" "Very good," the teacher said. Then she asked, "What is so special about Easter?" The same little girl raised her hand and answered, "It's special because Jesus was raised from the dead..." Before the teacher could compliment her, she continued "but if He sees His shadow, He has to go back in for seven weeks!" Well, two out of three isn't so bad, is it? That little girl was at least on the right track, and that is remarkable, since our society seeks to fill the heads of our children with any and every other reason imaginable for the special nature of this holiday.

It would do us all good to meditate on this question: what's so special about Easter? Were we to ask this question to the general populace, I imagine we would come up with a variety of different answers: a time for family reunions, Easter baskets, new clothes, plenty of store sales, extra time off, Spring Break, chocolate, Easter egg hunts, visits from the Easter Bunny and so forth. All those things are nice, but they do not mark the reason for the special nature of Easter.

Of course, we, as Christians know the real reason Easter is special: Easter is God's declaration that death is defeated and that eternal life is now ours. It is this belief which makes ours such a living, vibrant faith. The apostle Paul wrote in I Corinthians 15:19, "If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied." How true this is! If Christianity were only a moralistic movement, a good feeling society, or a social action group, then of what use would it be? How different would we be from any of a number of groups and organizations that do the same things? These things are important, and our faith certainly embraces morals, good feelings and social action. But, the human heart cries out for so much more. Those things are of little comfort in critical care rooms in hospitals, or in funeral homes or at gravesides. No, it is at these places, where the words of the Gospel take on a powerful meaning for us; "I am the Resurrection and the Life... whoever lives and believes in me shall never die." (John 11:25a-26) It is this promise that has sustained Christians throughout the years: this is not the end; we will live with God forever because Jesus has defeated the powers of sin and death. To paraphrase an old hymn, we can "...face tomorrow because He lives."

This is why Easter is so special to us and always will be. It is proof positive that we can trust Jesus from here to eternity, confident that He will be with us every step of the way. Jesus lives, now and forever! Hallelujah! I hope to see you in church each Sunday, and especially on Easter Sunday to celebrate this special day!

From Your Associate Pastor of Missional Discipleship

If you've had the opportunity to walk between the new education building and the historic sanctuary building, perhaps you noticed the new disciple paver garden. (I've included some pictures on the back of this newsletter.) A detailed article about this new addition was provided in the recent December Lamplighter. Now, that it has been completed, I get to walk past this new space several times a day. The story about how the marble that now displays the names of the twelve original disciples was once part of a single cross that stood in our prayer garden is not self-evident to anyone encountering it for the first time. In other words, something completely new and beautiful has been created out of recycled and broken pieces.

As we move closer to Easter, the Christian doctrine of the resurrection is before us. The Apostles' Creed teaches us that Jesus "suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, was buried, and on the third day rose again." There is nothing more central to Christian belief than the resurrection. Why is that? Well, believing in the resurrection of Jesus carries with it so much more than acknowledging what happened in history almost two-thousand years ago. The resurrection of Jesus extends beyond a specific point in time. Instead, resurrection is central to the Christian faith because it points us to the truth about how God works in our lives. If God can raise His own Son from the dead, then he can give eternal life to our mortal bodies as well. The story of the true disciple of Jesus Christ, is one where we acknowledge that through Jesus' death and resurrection, we too are raised from the death of sin and despair and into new and abundant life.

What do people see when they look at those of us who claim to be Jesus' disciples? Might I suggest that the new disciple paver garden at our church be an example to all of us. People do not need to know our past to recognize what God is doing with us today. Yet, it is our past that makes it possible for us to be who God has made us to be now.

Resurrection is certainly about Jesus without whom there would be no hope of eternal life. Also, for those of us who belong to Jesus, our resurrection hope comes directly from His. Remember we are Easter People!

Family Ministries

This year Easter is coming much sooner than normal, but I thought I would share an activity that I shared last year and is fun for all families in our church no matter their size; making resurrection rolls! This has become a tradition for me, and I love sharing it with others. A resurrection roll is using some yummy ingredients to tell the story of Jesus being placed in the tomb and then getting to experience the Empty tomb! You will never look at a crescent roll the same!

Start by gathering all your ingredients. You will need a tube of crescent rolls, large marshmallows (peeps also work well in this activity), cinnamon and sugar in a small bowl (or you can buy the premade mixture) and a small bowl of melted butter.

Bring the kids to the table, and begin the story by telling them about Jesus' death on the cross and resurrection from the dead. (I usually reference Mark 15 and 16 when talking with children.) This is the reason for the season, for our excitement for spring and new life and so it is important to share Jesus every opportunity we get.

Now, share what each of the ingredients represents. Have the children each take a marshmallow, which represents Jesus. Then dip the marshmallows in the butter and then roll it in the cinnamon and sugar. This represents the way the women prepared Jesus' body for burial by anointing Him with oil and spices.

Place each marshmallow in the center of a crescent roll and wrap it up, tucking and sealing the ends well. The crescent roll represents Jesus' grave clothes and how they wrapped His entire body. Put the rolls on the baking sheet and place them in the tomb (oven set to 400 degrees) and seal the tomb with a big rock (the oven door). While the rolls bake (about 15 minutes), the marshmallow will disappear, leaving behind nothing but a sweet, cinnamon sugar coating in the center.

Remove the rolls from the oven. Once they are cool enough to handle, have the children pull apart the rolls to reveal the (now invisible) marshmallow. Tell them about Jesus' resurrection and how when the women arrived at the tomb, they found it empty. Jesus had risen from the dead!

This activity is not just for young children, but ANY child of God can do this. It can give us another way of seeing the Easter story. Every time I pop open a tube of crescent rolls or grab a bag of marshmallows, it reminds me of the sacrifice that God made for me in sending His son Jesus to die on the cross and then rise again after 3 days to save me from my sins. May this Easter be a time of renewal for you in your relationship with Christ and you hear and take action for the call that He has placed on every one of us to rise each day and do everything that we can to serve Him!

I pray this Easter is filled with wonder and helps you draw nearer to our Lord and find new ways that He has blessed you and opportunities to serve Him in our lives, our church and our community.

All legal documents are being kept in a fireproof safe held by the Senior Pastor. All Trust/Endowments have been properly recorded with FMCW named as Beneficiary and are held and invested at the Methodist Foundation. The church and campus is accessible and satisfies ADA standards.

On behalf of the homeless men and lunch recipients who used Zion Shelter and Kitchen in 2023, we the Board of Directors want to extend a heartfelt **Thank You** for your generous support over the past year.

In 2023, the staff and volunteers of Zion Kitchen prepared and delivered over 17,750 meals (up 4000 from 2022), and Zion Shelter provided 2,050 bed/nights to men (up 300 from 2022) who had nowhere else to sleep in comfort and safety.

Zion continued to offer professional Case Management services in 2023 to each of our homeless clients, with the goal of assisting them in escaping homelessness. We also help staff "Safe Harbor," a program that provides emergency, short-term housing in local motels for individuals and families when they initially—and often unexpectedly—find themselves homeless. Zion provides and staffs a "homeless hotline" that helps the homeless access available resources.

All the above was made possible by your generosity. We are inspired by your expression of caring and humbled by your support of our efforts to meet the needs of the homeless and food insecure in Beaufort County.
