"Mine...or His?"

"The earth is the Lord's, and all it contains; the world, and those who live in it." Psalm 24:1 NASB

If you have ever known the joy of sharing life with "little ones," you are well aware of a phase of growing up through which they go, called the "terrible twos." During this phase, children go through a lot of change and some of that change can be quite challenging. It is in this phase that they begin to assert independence, insisting on doing things for themselves, like dressing themselves...even if they don't yet have the full capability to do so. It is during the terrible twos that many children develop a fondness for using the word "NO!" as a big part of their vocabulary. Initially, it may be cute or funny, but after a while, children have to be "instructed," if you will, as to it's proper use.

Another challenging concept for little ones is that of possession or ownership. During this "terrible twos" phase, it seems to them that everything around them, especially those things they like, are in fact theirs. They mark their territory fiercely and should anyone attempt to infringe upon them, they set things straight with a loud declaration..."MINE!" Again, it becomes the task of loving parents, caregivers, and others in their lives to help set the record straight; that in fact, not everything is "theirs."

Some lessons are harder to learn than others. It would seem that there are times when many of us still struggle with our belief that everything is "ours." We worked for it, we earned it, we want it, it's ours, right? Well, yes...and no. The challenge for us is in understanding the difference between ownership and stewardship. Ownership implies that we are wholly responsible for that which we have received. Stewardship, on the other hand, has a much deeper meaning. Stewardship indicates what we have received has been entrusted to us for the purpose of being enjoyed, yes, but also for being used wisely for a greater purpose.

As disciples of Jesus, we believe the higher purpose in question is that of both showing our gratitude to God for all of His goodness to us and to use what has been entrusted to us for His greater will and glory. Ben Simpson in his book, Committed to Christ: 40 Devotions for a Generous Life, writes, "All our possessions are gifts that have been given to us, and we are to steward and put them to good use. The portion we return to God through the tithe or other special gifts is a recognition of the origin of all that we possess. God has graciously provided us with all we have, whether through financial prosperity or the health, mental acumen and diligence that was necessary for us to obtain what we have earned. Financial giving is a much more inviting proposition when we first declare to God, "It's all Yours!"

During this month of September, you are invited to think about the meaning of true stewardship for your life and for the life of our church. You will be hearing sermons on the subject and receive information from church leaders about how God is blessing us and how He is calling us to be faithful to our vows of supporting both First Church and the Kingdom of God through our "prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness."


Global Methodist Church Convening Conference Why?

For widely understood reasons, many Global Methodists do not have warm feelings about General Conferences. They conjure up memories of very costly gatherings that were often marked by bitter conflict and bad press. All of which were hard to explain to family and friends and to people genuinely interested in learning about the transforming power of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Consequently, it is not surprising some Global Methodists ask, "Why a General Conference? By holding them, aren't we just setting ourselves up for the conflict and heartache we want to leave behind?"

These are legitimate questions, that deserve thoughtful answers. First, a little history is in order.

In one way or another, all Methodist denominations trace their origins back to John Wesley and the early Methodists who routinely "conferenced" together, first informally, and over time, more formally. For our  $18^{th}$  century ancestors, gathering for a conference was a time for prayer, worship, theological reflection, and a corporate and disciplined examination of the body's effectiveness for fulfilling its shared mission. Conferences were deemed so essential to the vitality and growth of the movement that to this day nearly all Methodist denominations continue to conference together.

Over their long histories, most Methodist denominations' General Conferences are not typically marked by conflict, bitterness and disunity. Far more often, they are regarded as critical seasons of corporate examination, rededication, and renewal. And sometimes, by the power and grace of the Holy Spirit, General Conferences are times of revival, where whole churches are moved to more passionately witness to and fully live out the gospel of Jesus Christ. This longer and broader view of Methodist conferencing is important to keep in mind <u>as Global Methodists gather in San Jose, Costa Rica, September 20-26, 2024, for their convening General Conference</u>.

## Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's finance committee has selected the *Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and education ministries in this community and around the world

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on *Consecration Sunday*. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she choses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

Thanks in advance for your enthusiastic participation in Consecration Sunday events.

### Online Giving is Live!

Greetings, wonderful church family! We wanted to let you know that there are two new ways you can donate to support all the amazing programs spreading God's Word and His love through First Methodist Church. On the bulletin, you can use the **QR** Code and on our website, use the drop-down menu and select Online Giving. Instructions for both below.

QR Code: Open the Camera application on your phone. Line up the QR code on your screen until you see the yellow brackets appear and form a square around the QR Code. You will see a yellow bar open with a hyperlink to the website. Press the hyperlink and it will take you to the Online Giving page on our website. Skip to step #3 on Online Giving for next steps.

#### Online Giving:

- 2. On your computer, select Online Giving from the bar under the picture (to the right, next to Calendar):



3. On your phone: From the **Primary Menu** (3 red bars upper left) drop down, select **Online Giving** (near bottom). On the next page, press the button that says **Give to FMC Washington**:







- 4. Select **Budget** or other area to give to and <u>type in amount</u>—press **Donate**. A box will pop up on screen that says **VIEW ORDER** and the amount you indicated you want to donate. Press on **View Order**—it will take you to the checkout screen. If it is correct, press **Continue** to payment.
