These are just a couple of examples of the people of First Church taking the vows of membership seriously, participating in the ministries of the church through "prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness."

That legacy is still alive and well at the corner of Van Norden and West 2nd. I give thanks to God for work, witness and worship that take place as the result of God's people at First Church coming together to do God's work and to be God's people. May God help us to continue to seize our opportunities and in so doing, be able to gratefully proclaim, "This is the work of my church...and I helped!" See you in church Sunday.

Does God Participate In Trick-Or-Treating?

This question is not intended to make a moral or theological statement about Trick-Or-Treating. Please do not misunderstand. I thoroughly enjoy the Trick-or-Treating tradition of our Smallwood community. I enjoy the excitement my community has, to generously share with kids from all around, and I enjoy dressing up the boys and witnessing their joy in receiving at this stage in their childhood. (Though as a responsible father, I make sure to monitor their caloric intake through levying an income tax on their "stash.")

Of course, Halloween has a religious/spiritual history, though in this brief article I wish to explore the place of the One we worship in the midst of the contemporary tradition we all know as Trick-Or-Treating. I'm glad that the "trick" part of the original ritual has mostly gone by the wayside. Now we focus primarily on the "treating," the exchange of candy prompted by the masked characters who walk from door to door fostering neighborly kindness and joy against the backdrop of nighttime and "scary" themes.

Two opposing thoughts come to my mind when I contemplate the participation of God in such a ritual. On one hand, I think of God's generosity toward us. I think of God's nature who receives us as we are, masked or not, when we come to the door as beggars. Jesus surely teaches us, "Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you," Matthew 7:7. How dare I question the generosity and kindness of our God. But on the other hand, I can't water down the character of God to being a holy vending machine. There is great danger in treating the object of our worship as the dispenser of all we want in life. Lest we receive healthy fruit instead of our desired candy. God isn't transactional with us, but instead He exercises supreme authority over our lives. Perhaps in the trick-or-treating scenario, God may be better represented as the child coming to the door seeking from us expecting us to open our lives up to His directing will.

So does God participate in Trick-or-Treating? First, there are no "tricks" with God, only truth and covenant. God does certainly receive us as we are, and cares for us out of His generous grace. God also, manifested through Christ, comes to the doors of our lives, seeking our response to His grace.

The last several years, the Bazan household has participated in Trick-or-Treating as both seekers and givers. It makes for a busy evening when we attempt to do both at the same time. I'm joyfully awaiting the position in which I find myself at the end of this month. Perhaps also, we can be joyfully looking for Christ in the festival. He might come to us on the opposite side from where we find ourselves. May we receive him either way.

(Kristen Tisho is the daughter of Ken and Lee Matveia.) For those of you who could not attend, please see a summary of their ministry at the Berega Orphanage below. They requested prayers as they continue to serve our Lord and King."

God's Ministry at Berega Orphanage-Tanzania With The Tishos

Berega Orphanage began in the late 1960s to care for children who lost their mothers in childbirth. We continue to care for newborns whose mothers have died in childbirth or shortly thereafter as well as children whose mothers are unable to care for them due to health issues. In 2006, a new model was introduced where babies come to the orphanage with a Binti. Also, three years ago, we began helping mothers who are unable to produce enough breast milk to feed their newborns. They come and live together with us at the orphanage.

- B. We have 16 children (generally average between 12-18)

We use the 3 years we have with the family caregivers to love and disciple them. Our goal is that their time with us feels profitable and more like going to school than putting their lives on pause to care for their relatives.

PRAYER GARDEN GUIDELINES

The Prayer Garden was designed and funded by First Methodist members, Frances and Tad Larkin. If possible, the committee will include one or more members of the Larkin-Roebuck family. The committee provides the care and maintenance of the Prayer Garden.

The Prayer Garden is provided as a place for worship, as an invitation to prayer—a quiet place for personal and group meditation. It is not a recreational/play area. It is to be considered and used as a sacred part of the church—an outside sanctuary.

As such, it may be used for weddings, provided the Pastor approves, and the church's official wedding guidelines and policies are followed.

While the Prayer Garden is not to be considered a cemetery in the traditional sense, it may, however, be used for the interment of the cremains of members of First Methodist Church, provided the following rules are observed:

- 1. It is recommended that the cremains be poured into the ground at designated locations beside the cross.
- 2. No permanent vessels containing the cremains may be buried in the Prayer Garden. All containers must be quickly biodegradable.
- 3. No burial markers are to be placed anywhere in the Prayer Garden.
- 4. No artificial memorial flowers, wreaths, or plants may be placed in the Prayer Garden.
- 5. The Church will be responsible for providing the Memorial plaque and for keeping the records of the location of the interred cremains.

Safety & Security Team Update

Several months back, Church Council asked that a committee be formed to look at our safety and security here at FMCW. A committee was formed that includes Rick Amick, Rick Anderson, Ron Branch, Seth Edwards, Stan Friedman, Pastor Ken Hall, Rick Howdy, Walter Jessup, Ken Matveia, Brian McCormick, Charlie Moore and Mark Reames. Members were chosen due to their past experience in providing safety and security to large crowds, military, law enforcement or medical experience. We have had several meetings over the summer and presented Church Council with 10 recommendations for initial improvement that were approved at their July meeting. The recommendations are to be implemented once a Policy and Emergency Action Plan is developed.

- 1. Provide Evacuation maps for building entries and classrooms.
- 2. Establish Fire Evacuation Point as follows:
 - a. Wesley Hall
 b. Sanctuary
 Parking lot across from Police Station along Third Street
 Parking lot across from Post Office along Second Street
- 3. Identify Tornado Shelter areas:
 - a. Wesley Hall Welcome Center area and hallways adjacent to it
 - b. Sanctuary Basement area
- 4. Medical Response Supplies:
 - a. Wesley Hall AED and Trauma Bag located across from the Welcome Center
 - b. Sanctuary AED and Trauma Bag located in hallway between Sanctuary and Parlor
 - c. First aid kits in Kitchen preschool and child care areas
- 5. Limit Sunday Service access areas:

Ushers will be stationed at each of the main access points. Other doors will be locked and once service starts all access points will be locked except the Main entry to the service area.

- 6. Contract for Police Services:
 - Recommend that the Washington City Police be contracted to supply one officer and patrol car to our parking lot between the hours of 8:30 and 12:30 each Sunday.
- Preschool and Child Care Boards:
 - Recommend to each board that they install a coating to their doors and windows that will allow workers to see out, but keep people outside from being able to see inside the classrooms.
- 8. Sponsor Responsibilities:
 - Develop a handout for those hosting meetings, activities or outside events of their responsibilities for the safety and security of those they are hosting.
- 9. Intruder/ Active Shooter on Premise:
- Train members on what to do in the event an intruder or active shooter is on the premises.
- 10. Communicate these safety and security improvements to FMCW membership through various means to keep them informed and educated.

The Safety and Security Policy, once approved by Church Council, will be posted on the church website. Those responsible for taking actions in the event of an emergency will be trained on the Emergency Action Plan. Should you have questions, concerns, or ideas for additional improvements, please contact one of the committee members listed above. Thank you.

Global Methodist Provisional Annual Conference

The Global Methodists convened for their first annual conference in Winston Salem in June of this year. Though I agreed to fulfill my responsibility as your Lay Delegate and attend this conference, my heart was not in the going. That pervading sense of joy and the historical significance of this gathering settled on me as I began to soak it all in.

I would like to share a few of my memorable moments from the conference.

Bishop Mark Webb spoke to the leadership of the Global movement and in our churches, saying that leadership should point us not to what we want to do or where we want to be, but to what God wants us to be and do. I loved when Bishop Webb explained that each of us has at least one gift given to us by God to grow this church - no role is greater/ no role lesser - each and everyone's gift is needed!

When Vice-President Pro Tempore Kari Howard spoke, my heart rose as she proclaimed "God chose this time for the Global Methodist Church!" I heard the words of a favorite song, "maybe we were made for these days."

Rev. Howard continued by saying that we, as Global Methodists, are going on to perfection to reform the church and spread spiritual holiness throughout the land to save souls! Amen, right?! She challenged us all to use this mission statement to draw in others by bold witness and to build the culture of the Global church from the youngest of the children to the oldest of us - to claim Jesus as our Lord!

President David Banks spoke on the role of the Laity in the Global Church to be in the ministry of the gospel of Christ as we share the gospel of salvation which is available to everyone! He shared an enlightening perspective - that we die moment by moment over our lifetime, yet EVERY moment of our life is an opportunity to tell someone about God. Rev.
