

### **Thanksgiving**

Over the years, I have seen several historical documentaries about the birth of our country and the lives of those who made it possible. These founders were truly remarkable people. Through their writings, actions and their very lives, they stood for those things that truly matter. After our country became a free and independent nation, one of these founding fathers, George Washington, wrote the first Presidential Thanksgiving Proclamation on November 26, 1789. He began this proclamation by acknowledging the providence of God. He concluded the proclamation by recognizing the Lord as the giver of national prosperity. In between were no less than two dozen assertive references to the goodness of God. There was no doubt in George Washington's mind that the birth of this nation and its marvelous blessings were cause for deep gratitude on the part of the whole nation to God.

In his diary on that day, there is found this entry in his own handwriting: "Being the day appointed for Thanksgiving, I went to St. Paul's chapel, though it was inclement and stormy, but few people at *church.*" The father of our country had seen the deep snows of Valley Forge; he had struggled constantly against the British enemy and even some on the American side, who said he would be defeated; he had seen many of his own men desert the cause of freedom and had suffered the sting of betrayal from some closest to him. But, despite all of this, Washington could not help but be grateful to God. Therefore, he went to church on that first "official" Thanksgiving to praise and thank God. What a pity that so many others, who were also enjoying the fresh air of freedom, allowed the weather that day to keep them from publicly thanking God for the founding of this nation and all of the other benefits that came their way because of this!

We must be careful not to fall into such a trap. Too often it is easy to allow those things that matter to slip from our minds and lives. 'We forget that we are not the sole authors of our good fortune; that we are the beneficiaries of the "...giver of every good gift." Such knowledge and such blessings should cause us to want to give thanks to God at every opportunity, come rain or shine. Each time we gather for worship is a time for us to express our thanks and praise to God "...for all His benefits." As God's blessed people, let us resolve to also be God's grateful people, not only on the fourth Thursday of November, but all year round. See you in church Sunday!

# From Your Associate Pastor of Missional Discipleship

"Give thanks with a grateful heart. Give thanks to the Holy One. Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ His Son."

This contemporary song of praise, exemplifies the words of Ephesians 5:19-20 which reads, "as you read psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, signing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Thanksgiving, beyond being a holiday, is a biblical mandate. Thanksgiving frees us from self-centeredness and directs our lives outwardly. It first reminds us that what we have comes from another source. Remembering that Jesus is the source of our blessings, keeps us from stressfully striving to obtain blessings for ourselves. Also, thanksgiving points outwardly because it calls us to charitable living.

I admit I used to critically admonish the discontentment we all observe as a society— one day we celebrate being thankful and content with our blessings, and then immediately (the very next day) turn toward purchasing more consumer goods. How hypocritical we are, I thought. Can't we just live with contentment. But thanksgiving is more than learning to be content.

Thanksgiving, shows us how our cups run over with blessing so much so, in fact, that we get to direct where the overflow goes. Sometimes that spurs us on to shower others with tangible gifts, but can also manifest itself in the giving of time, making an effort to be extra kind in a stressful season, communicating words of affirmation, or to show our love for others in a myriad of ways.

Both the song and scripture point to the fact that thanksgiving begins "in our hearts." When our hearts are bent toward God, we then find the power source for all that God can do through us. In a trying year, it may or may not be easy to find what we are truly thankful for. Yet, when we begin the search in our hearts, I believe we can find much more to be thankful for than not. This Thanksgiving, let us turn our hearts over to the Lord.

# Bricks and Mortar

The Global Methodist Church convening General Conference concluded on 26 September 2024 at San Jose, Costa Rica. The Conference adopted a limited agenda due primarily to time constraints and to allow people who have yet to join the GMC from around the world the ability to participate in the establishment of the rules that will govern the church moving forward. The work done at the conference has created an entirely new general church organization emphasizing local churches organized in Annual Conferences supported by a Connectional Council and Connectional Commissions.

Some specific objectives accomplished by the Conference include:

- Adoption of the GMC Constitution
- Proclamation of a Mission and Vision Statement
  - Mission The Global Methodist Church exists to make disciples of Jesus Christ and  $\Diamond$ spread scriptural holiness across the globe.
  - Vision Through the empowerment of the Holy Spirit, the Global Methodist Church  $\Diamond$ envisions multiplying disciples of Jesus Christ throughout the earth who flourish in scriptural holiness as we worship passionately, love extravagantly, and witness boldly.
- The election of Scott Jameson Jones and Mark James Webb as Bishops of the Global Methodist Church.
- The election of interim Bishops (2024-2026) John Pena Auta (Nigeria), Kimba Evariste (DRC), Jeff Greenway (Allegheny West), Leah Hidde-Gregory (Mid Texas), Kenneth Livingston (Trinity), and Carolyn Moore (North Georgia).
- Designating Africa as the location for the 2026 GMC General Conference (specific Country TBD).
- Acknowledgement of Rev. Mike Schafer as our first Chief Connectional Officer. Election of Rev. Tom ٠ Lambrecht and Rev. Lamar Oliver, respectively General Conference Secretary and Petitions Secretary.
- Adopted an updated Book of Doctrines and Discipline replacing the Transitional Book of Doctrines and Discipline. The updated edition will remain in effect through December 31, 2024. Amendments adopted by the Conference, based on resolution of 250+ petitions, will be incorporated into a subsequent version which will take effect on January 1, 2025.

As we emerge from the pivotal convening General Conference in San Jose, a sense of renewed purpose and determination is palpable across the Global Methodist Church. The work done at the conference has set a strong foundation, and now the elected team is moving forward with great care, intent, and focus on the many steps ahead. ### One Call Now Procedure Update

Purpose—The Purpose of our church's <u>One Call Now</u> system is to provide timely, effective, and important messages to the church family through messages sent via Text and/or Email.

To achieve this purpose, we are reviving our procedures regarding the enrollment and messaging capabilities of this service.

Enrollment—First Methodist Church provides One Call Now service only to those in our congregation who enroll. The service allows us to send messages to all enrolled and to sub-groups within the congregation via Text and/or email. One Call Now allows individuals to self-remove their enrollment at any time, and they guarantee the security of contact information.

We do not automatically enroll members. Each member should sign up individually by filling out a One Call Now form found on the church website, or by returning a paper copy found at the Welcome Center to the Church Office. Once enrolled, you will receive messages through the phone number or email address you provide.

Messaging—Since One Call Now has become a popular way for many groups in our church to send messages to church members, we are updating our procedures so that those enrolled can receive timely, effective, and important messages.

### General Messaging to all enrolled (Congregational messages)

in length. The message must denote the sending committee. [next event] on [date] at {time}.

2) We are limiting the number of messages regarding any single event to three.

3) If requests for messages are received after regular church office hours, they will not be sent out until the following day when the church office is open. We are recommending requesting the message in plenty of time before you need the message sent. Exceptions may be made for strict emergencies.

#### Sub-Group Messaging

4) One Call Now does allow for subgroups. Leaders who would like to manage their own sub-group are allowed to do so. Please see Stephen Bazan to gain access to this feature. If you administer a sub-group, you will be responsible for the messaging procedures within that group's parameters. All members of a sub-group must also be enrolled in the general messaging to the whole church.
