But even before we took a bite from that drumstick, or saw the first larger than life comic strip character make its way past Macy's, the media and stores bombarded us with advertisements, sales and displays all pointing to the coming Christmas season (as if we would forget without their "gentle" reminders). There's a change in the air, and not just from the dropping temperatures. All around us, we can feel the excitement of Christmas on the way, and it feels pretty good.

But, amid all the holiday whirl of Christmas shopping, bargain hunting and present wrapping, we need to stop for a few moments and examine ourselves. In this Advent season, we need to ask ourselves, "<u>Have we got room for</u> <u>Jesus in our lives, not just at Christmas, but in all of our lives</u>?" Let us resolve here and now that we won't allow the real reason for Advent and Christmas to get lost amid the red tag sales and television specials. Let us allow ourselves to be open to this special time of God's love. May all of you have a joyous, blessed and meaningful Christmas season. See you in church Sunday!

Differently Waiting

To My First Church Family,

Waiting patiently has never been a great virtue of mine. I have a feeling, it's not a strong virtue for anyone; at least not naturally. Waiting around fills us with angst. It makes us nervous. We don't always know what to do when we have to wait. However, as a self-proclaimed visionary person, I find that I'm called to wait for ideas and visions to come to fruition more often than I like.

There are plenty of unresolved issues that we've been waiting to see resolution to for quite some time. Waiting is not fun, especially when there are serious and real matters at stake. The reality is God may need us to wait even longer.

As much as we don't like the concept of waiting, it's important to remember that waiting is a hallmark of the Christian identity. From the moment of Christ's ascension, Christians have lived and died in a state of waiting. We are people in waiting for Christ's return. We look for that day when all will be made right again. We look for that time when "swords will be transformed into plowshares, and spears into pruning hooks, where nation will not lift up sword against nation, and where they will learn war no more" (Isaiah 2:4, Joel 3:10, Micah 4:3). We are waiting for the Kingdom of God to finally be established forever on earth like it is in heaven. We wait for His glory and righteousness to reign in our souls and communities. We have been waiting for a *looonnnng* time for these promises to come to pass. So much so that it is part of who we are; we are a people who wait.

As people who wait, we wait differently than the rest of the world. While the world waits in states of anxiety and impatience, Christians wait in **anticipation**. While we wait for the Kingdom, we don't just sit on our hands and do nothing. Nor do we force the world to bend to our will. Waiting in anticipation means that we are working for the Kingdom in conjunction with its being built. We live as though it is already present, active and has dominion over our life. We worship welcoming Christ's presence with us every week in full anticipation that he will indeed be with us.

Advent is about remembering how to wait as a Christian. We wait for Christmas, for Christ to come again into our world. In our waiting we anticipate Christ's presence with us already. Let us remember after a year where a lot of waiting has occurred, that we know better than most how to wait differently. And may we, as we wait, continue to live as though Christ's rule is here and now.

Thank you for your support of Open Door Women's Shelter. With your help, we continue to provide a safe place for women and their children to live together while gaining skills and resources necessary to transition into a stable, long-term home.

Open Door Women's Shelter welcomed our first residents in January 2019 and has since served 120 women and 56 children. We recently transitioned a mom and her 9-year-old daughter. They arrived at our shelter just after Christmas and remained residents through May, eventually finding their own home with the assistance of our community. Today that mom is a volunteer with our shelter's Day Center program, sharing her experience with homelessness with our current residents.

Open Door is expanding! We are working toward raising funds to add a 3,000 square foot addition that will provide 15 more beds for women and children! Please visit our website for more information.

Update on Safe Harbor Helpline:

Whether it is a fire, a lost job, illness, a financial challenge resulting in an eviction, leaving an uninhabitable living space, domestic conflict, or the lack of affordable housing, individuals and families end up living in their cars or other unsafe places. Imagine not knowing where your next meal will be, hot having a place to take care of personal needs, and not feeling safe! It is a traumatic experience, especially for children. Safe Harbor provides a temporary safe solution. Everyone deserves to be safe!

Safe Harbor Helpline is now a non-profit program under the umbrella of Agape Health Services. Agape's mission is "To provide high quality, comprehensive, coordinated primary healthcare and supportive services to the communities we serve and improve health through effective interventions, patient education and chronic disease management." We feel that Safe Harbor Helpline is a good fit with Agape.

We continue to collaborate with Zion Men's Shelter, Region 12 Coordinated Entry, and Open Door Women's Shelter, as well as many local agencies including DSS, Trillium, and Ecu Health Beaufort.

Safe Harbor Helpline continues to assist individuals and families experiencing homelessness. In the last fiscal year, 226 callers were given information and referrals on local agencies. Thirty-nine family units that met the HUD definition of homelessness were placed in the motel until an alternative could be determined. A total of 366 nights were purchased for these families. The breakdown of people assisted was: 31 women, 20 men, and 37 children. Twelve families, assisted by our case manager, went directly into housing from the motel.

We have received a generous challenge grant from the Eddie & Jo Allison Smith Family Foundation, and we must raise \$3,000 prior to December 31, 2024, to receive the matching funds. Please donate to help us meet this challenge. Use this address: 303 West 13th Street, Washington, NC 27889.
