"From Here to There"

This past week, I and the other Cabinet members of the North Carolina Conference of the Global Methodist Church had the privilege of meeting our new bishop, Jeff Greenway. Jeff comes to us from the Alleghenv West Conference after a long and distinguished time in the local church. He is also the co-author of the book <u>Multiplying Methodism</u>, which was read by many of us during our journey into the Global Methodist Church. I am grateful to be able to tell you that Jeff is very personable as well as knowledgeable, but above all he is committed to helping the church to live into its calling. He left us with little doubt of his great love for the church and for Jesus.

This past week, I also had the opportunity to be the teacher/facilitator of a couple of study/discipleship groups here at the church. In both instances, we reflected on the idea of real love. One thing became clear in both groups' conversations: love means wanting those we love to be the very best people that they can be and that means we have to be willing to hold one another accountable for our efforts in striving for this goal. It seems to me that this thought was present in some of Jeff's remarks to us this week. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some of what Jeff said to us, in hopes that it gives us all some food for thought.

Jeff began by joining us in celebrating God's goodness in guiding us to this point in time. We all acknowledged God's hand in our journey into the Global Methodist Church and gave thanks to God for the many signs of God's blessings in the lives of our congregations. At the same time, Jeff encouraged us not to be content in only reaching this point...he encouraged us to continue to follow in the footsteps of our Lord as we and our churches go from who we are now to what we can be with God's help; what He called a journey "...from here to there." Such a journey has many different elements. Jeff encouraged us to move from:

---Come and Do TO Go and Be: Sometimes churches will develop a case of "spiritual myopia," where we expect people to come to us and to fit into our lives together. We need to be willing to be people who are not content to stay behind the walls of the church, but rather be those who go into our communities, not for the sake of any program, but for the sake of living before others a "life that becomes the gospel."



- --- Infancy TO Maturity: We have to commit ourselves to continuing in the path of sanctification... growing daily in the knowledge and love of God, seeking not just our self-interests, but above all the will of God.
- --- <u>Making Church Members TO Making Disciples</u>: Connection to the church is important, but helping people become followers of Jesus is more important.
- --- <u>Dysfunctional Politeness TO Kingdom Kindness and Honesty</u>: We must learn how we can better speak the "truth in love" to one another with the aim of helping one another become the best disciples of Jesus we can be.
 - --- Carnal TO Spiritual: We must strive to "seek first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness."
- ---Moralism TO Holiness: We must not settle for a mindset of moralistic therapeutic deism (God wants us to be nice; the goal of life is just to be happy; God doesn't need to be in our lives, except when we want something) but rather to truly grow in our knowledge and love of God, as we "press on... to the upward call of God in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 3:14)
- --- <u>Information TO Transformation</u>: We must share the teachings of our faith, but we must also seek to share how they are applied and endeavor to help one another to live up to them.

This is quite a list...one that deserves some thought. I look forward to some times of conversation that may spring up around these thoughts. We have come a long way by God's grace and we love the church. I believe we love it enough to help the church become what it can be ... enough to help it in the journey "from here to there." See you in church Sunday!



From Your Associate Pastor of Missional Discipleship

It has been one year since we launched our Lay Shepherding program here at First Church. I wanted to give a brief update on the purpose of this program, celebrate its success so far, and help us look ahead into 2025.

With the help of our Lead Lay Shepherds, George and Bonnie Isovitsch, the Lay Shepherding program exists to help Ken and me in our task of looking after our family here at First Church. We imagine lay shepherding to help us in two major ways. First, to look after our existing members of the church. Second, by building relationships with new visitors and potential members by helping them get acquainted with our church in hopes that they will find themselves ready to become members. Lay shepherds lead groups (equally divided alphabetically), too accomplish four tasks. 1) They quickly introduce themselves to first time visitors by taking gift bags to their homes. 2) They continue to build relationships with returning visitors (we call them constituents) and help connect them to the pastors, to various life giving groups, and ministry opportunities throughout the church. 3) They connect at least twice a year with every church member to answer any questions and offer resources on an as needed basis, as well as share relevant information throughout the year with pastors and staff as needs arise. 4) They look to invite new gifted shepherds to join their team and help train them to eventually take their place when the time is right.

Lay Shepherding, even in its first infant year has already yielded great results for our church. Ken and I have appreciated the news we receive from our shepherds as it has helped us respond more timely and effectively to needs. We have welcomed 16 new members into the church in the last year and believe that the shepherds have had a big part to play in helping those new members feel connected and embraced well before joining our church. We have also noticed a greater number of members and visitors find and become engaged in life groups, Sunday school classes, and service ministries throughout the life of the church. All of this signals the strength and vitality of our church.

In the coming year, we are welcoming some new lay shepherds onto the team. We hope that you will continue to grow in your relationship with the church with the help of your lay shepherd and your pastors. We exist as servants to help give all of you the resources you need to live into your discipleship journey as we follow together our Head Shepherd Jesus Christ.

PRAYER GARDEN GUIDELINES

The Prayer Garden was designed and funded by First Methodist members, Frances and Tad Larkin. If possible, the committee will include one or more members of the Larkin-Roebuck family. The committee provides the care and maintenance of the Prayer Garden.

The Prayer Garden is provided as a place for worship, as an invitation to prayer—a quiet place for personal and group meditation. It is not a recreational/play area. It is to be considered and used as a sacred part of the church—an outside sanctuary.

As such, it may be used for weddings, provided the Pastor approves, and the church's official wedding guidelines and policies are followed.

While the Prayer Garden is not to be considered a cemetery in the traditional sense, it may, however, be used for the interment of the cremations of members of First Methodist Church, provided the following rules are observed:

- 1. It is recommended that the cremains be poured into the ground at designated locations beside the cross.
- 2. No permanent vessels containing the cremains may be buried in the Prayer Garden. All containers must be quickly biodegradable.
- 3. No burial markers are to be placed anywhere in the Prayer Garden.
- 4. No artificial memorial flowers, wreaths, or plants may be placed in the Prayer Garden.
- 5. The Church will be responsible for providing the Memorial plaque and for keeping the records of the location of the interred cremains.

Those who use the Prayer Garden, as a site for cremains interment may make a contribution to: "The Prayer Garden Maintenance Fund."

SPRC to lead an organizational review

As part of the UMC, First Methodist had little input regarding its organizational structure or succession planning. The GMC, within the provisions of the Book of Disciplines and Doctrines, allows more latitude for local churches to determine their structure and pastoral staff.

Given this new reality and the evolving needs of our church, the SPRC, with the blessing of the Church Council, has embarked on an organizational review. The foundation of this review will be information gathered from interviews with a diverse cross-section of church members from both services, as well as our pastors and staff. The objective is to better understand whether our current organizational structure and leadership can be enhanced to improve our ability to achieve our mission.

These one-on-one interviews will be conducted by members of an eight-person group established by SPRC. Interviews will be based on a set of five questions that are designed to determine the pulse of the congregation. They will take into consideration FMCW's Statement of Faith and Commitment (e.g., our Mission); FMCW;s culture, history and committee structure; and the career goals and expectations of our pastors and key staff. Interview responses will not be shared outside of SPRC so that interviewees feel comfortable openly expressing their insights.

After reviewing interview responses, SPRC will present a synopsis of those responses with accompanying recommendations to the Church Council no later than its May meeting. This review is expected to:

- Identify opportunities to improve efficiency of operation and effectiveness the execution of FMCW's Mission, especially towards achieving the goal of making disciples of Christ
- Review job descriptions for pastors and key staff to ensure that they are aligned with the Mission and related goals; and provide greater specificity and clarity regarding responsibilities and accountability to the achievement thereof
- Create a succession plan for pastors, key staff and lay leadership, so that stakeholders gain some clarity regarding FMCW's future leadership needs.

SPRC's report and recommendations will be made available to the congregation following Church Council's review. Pastor Hall and I welcome any questions you may have about this effort.
