

What Does It Mean To Say 'He Is Risen'

Sunday April 20th is Easter Sunday. Once again, churches around the world will be filled with crowds of people in their new Easter finery, Easter lilies, and the sounds of majestic choral anthems, as we proclaim to the world the blessed truth of the ancient orthodox Christian greeting: "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!" The celebration of this most important Christian festival is the highlight of the Christian year, and we all look forward to it.

But, what does Easter really mean to us? What does it really mean for us to join our voices as one, and proclaim, "He is risen!"? The celebration of this holy day did not start out in such a bold and joyous manner. It began with a group of men, who were "behind closed doors," who were afraid for their lives. 

We can truly call ourselves Easter people when we live joyfully in the knowledge that the Lord who holds the future is the same one who holds us in the palm of His loving hands. The Easter faith knows that whatever power's seem to control life, God's power in Jesus Christ is ultimately triumphant! Easter is a preview of our ultimate future: resurrection and eternal life with God in Christ! What a bright and glorious future it is!

This Easter, when we once again celebrate the resurrection of our Lord, may our worship be more than mere lip service. May Easter become for us, as it did for Jesus' first disciples, a source of courage, comfort and strength: a way of life. "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!" See you in church Sunday!

# From Your Associate Pastor of Missional Discipleship

We are blessed to have so many discipleship opportunities at First Methodist Washington. There are Sunday School Classes, short-term and long-term Bible Studies, and many forms of small groups that help give people a focused place for spiritual formation. John Wesley, when starting the Methodist Movement in the Church of England in the 18<sup>th</sup> Century, first stumbled on this idea that small intentional spiritual communities are the bread and butter of a growing church. In his day, he used the terms: Societies, Classes, and Bands as a way to describe three types of such communities found in the church.

Societies were the largest, making up the whole membership of the local church. They would focus primarily on corporate worship and teaching. To be a member of a society, all one would be accountable to would be the General Rules of the Church.

However, for deeper spiritual formation Classes would be made up of groups of 12-24 people, both men and women who dedicated themselves to sharing life together for the purpose of intentionally growing in their faith, and sharing in Christian service. Not to be confused with what we call "Sunday School Classes" today, Wesley's Classes met weekly, but usually in people's homes, and were made up of people who held each other accountable to a higher standard because their love and trust in one another allowed for it.

Yet still to go deeper, Wesley formed Bands. Bands were four to eight all-men or all-women groups that met regularly to edify each other, confess sins, and guide one another in ways that are hard to do with just anyone. They required great trust among the group members. Yet they yielded deeply mature Christians who became leaders within the church and society.

Today in the Global Methodist Church, there is great interest in rediscovering these original practices for reviving the Church. The good news is that we are well established here at First Church in that many of these groups have organically formed over the years. And others have blossomed through intentional prayer and commitment.

This month, I would like to highlight our Channels Missional Community. A Missional Community is closely related to Wesley's Classes. Our Channels Missional Community has grown together over eight years and is now in the process of multiplying their group in order to reach more people for Christ. They share deeply with one another through their prayers for one another, their support for each other and their respective families, and through their service to the church and the community.

I would also like to share that the idea of missional communities is beginning to take off in a new way here at our church in that there are two to three new groups who have planted seeds for growth. These are new in addition to Bath Time and the Yahoos who continue to do good work, too. May God continue to shower down blessings upon them each as they continue in this historic and good work for God's Kingdom.

#### BLAST FROM THE PAST

"I went to Washington, N.C., in December, 1898. I found the congregation worshipping in the town hall. They had commenced to build a nice brick church. The building was under cover and no money in hand to complete it, with a six thousand dollar debt to provide for. It took five thousand dollars to complete the church, and the conference had been invited to hold the session of 1899 there. I was informed by the Presiding Elder that there was no trouble there, and that the church would be completed without difficulty as the congregation was amply able to build it. I went there and went to work with all my might to relieve the situation...

With hard and constant work, we succeeded in finishing the church building at an additional cost of \$5,000 which we raised that year.
